# More than 'Mere Objects'

n First Friday next weekend, Wenatchee Valley College's MAC Gallery will display "Mere Objects," the latest installation by Plain artist Sarah Jane. In it, dozens of tiny glass vessels hang from the ceiling, each one containing

Every one represents a person who has experienced sexual violence, including Sarah Jane herself, who was in an abusive relationship several years ago.

"I think of myself as strong and smart and capable and independent, and I totally thought of myself that way while I was in this relationship," she said.

as someone that this can happen to."

The occasional days away from her partner brought clarity, and looking through old journals she was able to recognize the cycle of abuse. With the help of supportive friends, she was able to break free after seven years.

The idea for addressing the topic through partici"out of the blue" last fall. And, knowing her experience represented only a part of the reality of sexual assault, she sought out others willing to talk about theirs and find the best way to tell everyone's stories.

"I wanted something that would be very personal and that could also be anonymous," Sarah Jane said.

people to send in objects, along with a note, no name required. The items could be anything that meant something to the person involved, whether it was part of their healing journey, an element of the past they were ready to let go of, or simply something

So far, more than 60 women and men have sent contributions, including guitar strings, sand, beads, writings and more. Everything had to be small enough to fit inside the 5 mm opening of the spherical bottle, a shape Sarah Jane finds significant.

that brought them joy.

"Spheres have this sense of wholeness and when they're all hanging together they're a little bit like celestial bodies," she said. "They're very peaceful and beautiful together."

She also sees a "jewel-like" quality to the spheres, which feels right to her.

"I do want to celebrate the dignity and the value and the things that we feel like sexual violence takes away from people, but I don't think it does take away from people," she added. "Your


